Y7 & 8 MATHS WORKSHOP

On the 27th June the Maths Department held a workshop designed to challenge a selection of some of our more able students from Y7 and 8 at JMHS.

Students were tasked throughout the morning with a range of mathematical activities to work through in groups, these included watching mathematics magic tricks performed by Miss Loveridge and then trying to deduce how she did them.

For example, Miss Loveridge can add the first 10 numbers of any fibonacci sequence super quickly in her head. Students generated their own fibonacci sequences and she worked out the sum

Example: 1, 1, 2, 3, 5, 8, 13, 21, 34, 55

Miss knew that the sum of these numbers is 143 (she did this on the spot in seconds so they knew she couldn't have just added them up altogether in her head - there was a trick to doing it quickly!) They discussed the problem in groups and discussed the 'magic' behind each "trick." All the "tricks" Miss Loveridge performed had a mathematical reason behind them.

This was a fantastic opportunity for students to develop their maths skills and have lots of fun while they were doing so!


They received many compliments from the audience and poets on their performances. Well done to everyone involved.
