# LUDLOW CASTLE Y10 TRIP

On Wednesday 3<sup>rd</sup> July 63 Y10's travelled up to Shropshire to visit the medieval castle at Ludlow. The castle is the focus of their 'History Around Us' GCSE unit and the day proved invaluable in helping students experience at first hand the site they had studied in the classroom earlier in the year.

In glorious weather, with support from seven members of staff, they had the chance to explore what has been described as 'the most complete English example of a medieval fortified palace'. Those with a head for heights enjoyed the view from the top of the Great Keep, putting their learning about the geographical advantages of the location into perspective.

The tour of the site was followed by a walk down through the medieval grid of the old town centre, out through the Broad Gate arch and across the River Teme via Dinham Bridge. This gave us an opportunity to stroll along the Bread Walk with its idyllic riverside views and another fresh perspective on the castle from the viewpoint of the Welsh, whom the castle was first built to defend against.

## BERLIN

During the Easter holidays, 27 A level German and History students spent five days in Berlin, experiencing its culture and history. Not only did we get to enjoy the city sights and lots of German food, but the trip also brought both our subjects to life. On our first full day there, we visited Sachsenhausen KZ (a German concentration camp) and the Memorial to the Murdered Jews of Europe, which helped us to understand the true horrors of the Holocaust in a way that a textbook cannot. Throughout the trip, we visited many other prominent Berlin landmarks such as the impressive Reichstag, the Brandenburg gate and the very tall TV tower built by East Germany with its revolving restaurant at the top. We learnt a great deal about this multicultural city and its fascinating history on our sunny bike tour or walking tour of Berlin and improved our German language whilst doing so.
