Course content:

This is an enjoyable music course in which you will develop a wide range of skills in performing, composing and analysing music that leads nicely on from GCSE. You will perform on your instrument, develop skills in composing for different genres, analyse a variety of music and develop knowledge of musical harmony. In A-Level you will be able to choose your strongest skill out of performing and composing, this will then have a bigger weighting on your final grade.

A Level Content		
Unit 1 Performing 35% if performance specialist 25% if composition specialist	If you specialise in performance you will prepare a 10-12 minute performance with at least 3 pieces covering at least 2 areas of study. If you specialise in composition you will prepare a 6-8 minute performance with at least 1 piece covering 1 area of study.	
Unit 2 Composing 35% if composition specialist 25% if performance specialist	If you specialise in performance you will prepare two compositions where one is a classical brief and one is a free composition If you specialise in performance you will prepare three compositions where one is a classical brief, one from another area of study and one free composition	
Unit 3 Appraising 40%	You will study three areas of study (below), studying set works and doing wider listening to answer questions in an exam. You will answer questions on Area of Study 1, a choice of areas 2, 3 or 4 and a choice of areas 5 or 6.	

Skills acquired:

- Performance skills: Developing technical ability on your instrument to a high level and performing
- Composition skills: Develop skills writing music in different genres, develop knowledge of instrumental techniques, learn to use music software
- Musical Understanding: Develop listening skills, ability to use advanced musical vocabulary, further develop skills in reading musical notation, analysing scores of a variety of genres and knowledge of the areas of study below:

Methods of assessment:

- Unit 1 is marked by a visiting examiner
- Unit 2 is completed individually under controlled conditions, a CD and score will be submitted to the exam board
- Unit 3 will be assessed via a 2 hour 15 minute exam

Possible Careers:

Students who gain an A Level in Music go on to pursue a variety of careers in the Performing Arts. Music degrees at university and Music colleges require you to have an A-level in Music, and it is also beneficial for musical theatre courses. Music shows that you are creative, committed and confident to any universities or employers.

Example careers: professional musician in a variety of genres, conducting, music therapist, composer, music publisher, music teacher, musical theatre performer.

Prior experience:

It is recommended that you will have studied Music GCSE (grade 6 or above). Exceptions can be made on the condition that you play a musical instrument to a good standard (grade 6 and above), have experience of performing, and can read music easily. A basic knowledge of music theory is also recommended.

Extra Benefits:

All students that take Music A-level will be entitled to receive a **free** weekly 30 minute lesson on their instrument within school which would normally cost roughly £525 per year.

Students will also be offered the opportunity to perform a solo in a school concert (with or without orchestra)
