On the back of these results the vast majority of students have gone onto their first choice university and can be extremely proud of how well they have achieved. A Level subject highlights include:

Mathematics 59% A*to A grades Geography 55% A* to A grades French 75% A* to B Accounting 50% A* to B

Vocational subjects were also strong with Health & Social Care and Business Studies both achieving 60% Distinction* to Distinction.

> Y11 also celebrated strong results in their GCSE examinations this year. Many students who had worked extremely hard deservedly achieved good results with one individual highlight being Ella Lipscombe who achieved 9 grade 9s

> 66% of Year 11 students at John Masefield High School achieved at least 5 good grades including both English and Maths, a similar proportion to last year.

> There were particularly strong results in Chemistry and German in each of which over 40% of entries resulted in grade 7 or higher.

> For the fifth consecutive year JMHS did particularly well with the Ebacc measure, 38% of the cohort achieved good grades in all of the E-bacc subjects, well above the national average of around 20%.

FROM THE HEADTEACHER

Dear Parents/Carers,

Last week I had the huge pleasure of presenting GCSE certificates to our Y12 students along with Achievement and Merit awards to those in Y13. At the event, I remarked to parents how fortunate we are to have such a super group of young people in our sixth form. They are conscientious, highly supportive of each other and a pleasure to teach. We have a relatively small sixth form, but the students in our sixth form achieve consistently strong exam results and often go on to achieve great things, making us and their parents extremely proud. We learnt last year that a significantly higher proportion successfully complete their degrees than those in other schools or colleges. For instance the Higher Education Research Council reported that 89% of students from who have studied at JM6 achieve Upper Second Class or First Class Honours Degrees compared to a national average close to 70%. It has been interesting talking to former students about what they feel has contributed to their success at university and beyond. All give slightly different answers, but many cite small classes that have enabled excellent interaction and great teaching from teachers fascinated by their subject and committed to supporting all of the students in their class

It has also been a highly successful term for current JM6 students. Highlights include our physicists winning the Malvern Physics Olympiad, great success achieved in the UK Senior Maths Challenge including one student, Lizzie Austen, qualifying for the Olympiad and Will Flaherty achieving an excellent result in the Chemistry Olympiad. In addition to this academic success, the Sixth Form production of DNA was a huge success, we have had excellent participation in our sports teams and several of our young men raised considerable sums for the charity MIND. A group of Sixth Form students have also organised in conjunction with Community Action Ledbury, to entertain Ledbury's senior citizens on Wednesday 18th December with song, music and mince pies.

We are also extremely fortunate that many of our Sixth Formers are doing brilliant work with our younger students working as paid teaching assistants.

Lastly I would like to wish all of our readers a very Happy Christmas

CLIMATE CHANGE CONFERE

Thank you to all parents, carers, students and the local community for supporting the first John Masefield Climate Change Conference November. on 18 Conference was opened by Millie McCarthy ended with Hester Wilder refreshments. Dr. Des McDougall illustrated the current glacial extent, focusing on the Alps and explained that the current glacial extent does not follow the expected natural climatic variations. He linked the causes to the CO₂ concentrations in the atmosphere, which are unprecedented. He showed the complexity of the glacial and inter glacial patterns and noted that the current melting was revealing further, more accurate indicators of previous climates. These show that climate has been warmer, as trees are being released from the bottom of melting glaciers; frozen in time and allowing carbon dating to be undertaken. He stressed the importance of local factors and climatic feedback loops that provide a very difficult terrain for predicting specific impacts. However, he did confirm the most prolific impact will be global sea level rise and its implications for people and places.

Journey's End

On 23rd July Jacqui Ferrett and Jenny Davies set off for Penzance and from there began what was for them an epic journey – cycling the full length of the country and raising money for the CLD Trust...

Over 16 full days and 2 part days, we made our way first down to Land's End and then all the way up the west of the country to John O'Groats, carrying everything we needed on the bikes. And believe me - for me to pack in such a minimalist way was a huge undertaking in itself!!

More seriously, neither of us had ever undertaken anything like this before! Travelling down in the van, it properly dawned on us what we had undertaken to do. But, despite the odd moment of niggling doubt, we believed we could do it.

Five days later, we were back in Malvern, before heading off again the next day. We always wanted to make this a special occasion - but were overwhelmed by the number of family, friends, colleagues from JMHS, Malvern Joggers and, of course, representatives from the CLD Trust there to give us an amazing send off.

Down south we cycled through pretty intense heat, but were aware as we headed north that the weather had changed. We were so lucky to get through Manchester along the canal systems between the flooding - a day either side would have caused us a problem. And indeed, as we made our way further north, we seemed to only just miss the flooding in Inverness and Fort William.

But if this sounds like we escaped the deluges, actually no we didn't - on several days we got hit by very heavy rain. Sometimes we were lucky to find shelter in bus shelters, while other times we just got very wet. A friend once said to me, you don't know what getting properly wet is until you get wet on a bike, and I think we can safely say, we can vouch for

that. When you are cycling with actual puddles in your shoes and the padding in your shorts is so saturated with water, it feels like you're wearing a nappy, then you know you cannot get any wetter!

But we were determined to keep going no matter what! Probably the most hazardous part of our journey was climbing Shap, a 10 mile climb in the Lake District. Mid way up, we were hit by a deluge of biblical proportions with rain so heavy it made steps across the road and at times it turned to hail. In an exposed area with lightning threatened, we found ourselves cycling tucked tightly one behind the other and making plans to get off the bikes and lie flat on the sodden ground at the roadside if needs be. Luckily it did not come to that. However, we did alarm a couple in a car who made two attempts to transport us and our bikes safely off the hill. However, we remained firm telling them that we were raising money for charity - a pound for every mile we were to pedal - and that we couldn't cheat! Committed or foolish? The jury is still out on that one!

And yes, our sense of purpose remained with us. On the wettest of days, as I pedalled, I thought of the fact that teenage mental health is grossly under-funded and this gave power to my legs and pedals. On the 9th August, we arrived at John O'Groats after 1083 miles of pedalling and 51630 feet of climbing. We both felt a strong sense of achievement at having completed our personal challenge and (thanks to all the generous sponsorship) at having raised over £2,000 for the CLD Trust.



Y13 Physicists win Physics Olympics!

On 16 October, four Y13 Physicists took part in the Malvern College Physics Olympics, competing against schools from all sectors in Herefordshire, Gloucestershire and Worcestershire.

Ten teams were given very difficult Fermi questions to complete throughout the day, alongside tackling six 25 minute practical tasks which rigorously tested, challenged and stretched their Physics skills. The winners were announced after a talk from Dr Davide Gerosa (Lecturer in Gravitational Wave Astronomy from the University of Birmingham) and JMHS were proud to take first place, beating some very stiff competition.

A huge well done to Ben Davies, Will Flaherty, Mitch Robinson and Tom Williams who showed real star quality at the event. A big thank you to Mrs Williams-Hewitt and Mr Crossley who organised the team and accompanied the students.

Y11 TASTER DAY

On 25th October 130 of our Y11 students had a break from their usual GCSE diet and became Sixth Formers for the day experiencing a range of A level lessons as part of our advice and guidance on selecting the right path for themselves post-16. The students enjoyed being immersed in a wide range of A Level experiences from Maths investigations into what differentiation is and why we need to use it, to English where they explored how Margaret Atwood and Mary Shelley use the motif of three main dreams to convey meaning. In Biology students negotiated a series of practical experiments including dissection of a locust to explore what makes a good investigation while in German they looked at popular culture and politics to explore new vocabulary and gain an insight into modern Germany. Drama students analysed the work of Berkoff and his representations of the dirty underbelly of society and the Chemists experimented with transition metals investigating how their different energy levels influenced the part of the spectrum that was absorbed and therefore their colour. The students really enjoyed the day and the insight it gave into life as a Sixth Form student at John Masefield. The day will be followed up with discussions with a member of the Sixth Form team in early November to discuss further their subject choices.






SIXTH FORM PRODUCTION

In this play, a group of teenagers do something bad, really bad, then panic and cover the whole thing up. OLYMPIAD SUCCESS

A huge well done to Will Flaherty who took part in the Royal Society of Chemistry's 51st annual Olympiad. This competition was open to top students aged 16 to 19 and consisted of a considerably challenging written

exam. This went beyond the content covered at Alevel and was designed develop students thinking problem and solving skills. Will achieved the Silver Certificate for Round which immense achievement as in 2018 only 33% of 6527 entries received higher than bronze.





ROB WILSON—UK YOUNG RALLY DRIVER OF THE YEAR

For the last 3 years I have competed in the Junior 1000 Rally Championship, the British rally championship for young people aged from 14 to 17.

We started 2017 in a standard Nissan Micra rally car, we ran on a very small budget against much more experienced teams. In only my second event I won the class and came 5th overall. Throughout that year we picked up 5 class wins and the pre-03 championship title.

In 2018 we bought a top spec car that was well prepared. We won the first event overall in this car but due to multiple problems throughout the year we came 4th in the championship.

2019 has proven to be the most successful year in motorsport for us. We picked up a title sponsor, Ravenol, who have helped with the costs for 2019 and we hope to continue with them for 2020. The year got off to a great start, having 3 consecutive overall wins and going on the win 5 rounds in the year. We consolidated this with 7 podiums leading us on to win the 2019 Junior 1000 championship effectively putting us as the best under 17 team in the UK.

The achievement led us to the Professional Motorsport world expo awards. We were short listed as one of 5 potential drivers for the award, The UK young rally driver of the year. The evening was great, meeting the

head of BMW motorsport and also sponsors from 2019 and meeting potential 2020 sponsors also. It was a huge honour to take home the 2019 UK Young Rally Driver of the year award.

For 2020 we are hoping to move into senior rallying where the competition becomes a lot more fierce and we are hoping to move into a much faster car in hope to further my career. This of course depends on securing some great sponsorship.
