Course content:

This is an enjoyable course in which you will develop a wide range of skills in performing, composing and analysing music. The course is designed to further build on the skills learned at GCSE. You will perform on your instrument, develop skills in composing for different genres, analyse a variety of music and develop knowledge of musical theory. At A level, students can choose to specialise in either Performance or Composition.

A Level Content		
Unit 1	If you specialise in performance you will prepare a 10-12 minute	
Performing	performance with at least 3 pieces covering at least 2 areas of study.	
35% if performance specialist	If you specialise in composition you will prepare a 6-8 minute	
25% if composition specialist	performance with at least 1 piece covering 1 area of study.	
Unit 2 Composing 35% if composition specialist 25% if performance specialist	If you specialise in performance you will prepare two compositions where one is a classical brief and one is a free composition. If you specialise in composition you will prepare three compositions where one is a classical brief, one from another area of study and one free composition.	
Unit 3 Appraising 40%	You will study three areas of study (see table below). You will explore these through a combination of set works and wider genre study. Students will learn how to analyse music through score reading and the development of aural skills	

Skills acquired:

- Performance skills: Develop skills in performing to an audience and display technical ability on your instrument to a high level
- Composition skills: Develop skills writing music in different genres, knowledge of instrumental techniques and learn how to create music using software
- Musical Understanding: Develop listening skills, ability to use advanced musical vocabulary, further develop skills in reading musical notation, analysing scores in a variety of genres

Methods of assessment:

- Unit 1 is marked by a visiting examiner who attends a formal recital
- Unit 2 is completed individually under controlled conditions, a CD and score will be submitted to the exam
 board
- Unit 3 will be assessed by a formal exam lasting 2 hours 15 minutes

Possible Careers:

Students who gain an A Level in Music go on to pursue a variety of careers in the Performing Arts. Music degrees at a university or conservatoire require you to have an A-level in Music, and it is also beneficial for musical theatre courses. Music shows that you are creative, committed and confident to any universities or employers.

Example careers: professional musician, conductor, music therapist, composer, music publisher, music teacher, musical theatre performer, music journalism.

Prior experience:

It is recommended that you will have studied Music GCSE (Level 6 or above). Exceptions can be made on the condition that you play a musical instrument to a good standard (grade 6 and above), have experience of performing, and can read music easily. A basic knowledge of music theory is also recommended.

Extra Benefits:

All students that take Music A-level will be entitled to receive a **free** weekly 30 minute lesson on their instrument within school which would normally cost roughly £525 per year.

Students will also be offered the opportunity to perform a solo in a school concert.
