

Brenda has already made two visits to the school this term. Her first visit in February involved a selection of Y7-Y10 students who attended workshops where they created and performed their own poetry as well as watching Brenda perform some of her own. The visit helped inspire students to create poetry about things they loved and enjoyed.

Brenda's second visit in March involved another Poetry Writing Workshop with a group of enthusiastic Y7 & 8 students. She then held a successful "Poetry Clinic" in the school library where students were excited to spend time with Brenda either individually or in small groups to discuss and get feedback on their poetry or prose. Brenda also attended a staff briefing to give staff ideas on how poetry can be relevant and effective in all faculties throughout the school

The Spring Term has been both busy and successful. I have been impressed with how Y11 students are preparing for their summer exams. Over thirty teachers have been offering extra classes at lunchtime, during afternoon tutor time, after school, on Saturdays and during school holidays across nearly all subject areas. I am delighted with the large numbers of students taking up these opportunities and the way many Y11 students are determined to improve upon their mock exam results.

Sporting success has been another feature of the Spring term. Our Y9 Girls Netball team achieved the highest position for any state school in the West Midlands Finals. In the Herefordshire Winter Games Indoor Athletics, Y8 girls won Bronze, Y7 Girls silver and Y7 Boys gold. Our Y7 girls Hockey team also won a silver medal and our boys Badminton Team won Gold for the third consecutive year. Last week the badminton team went onto further success winning the regional tournament beating six other county champions and now have progressed to the National Finals, which is a magnificent achievement.

Our music students are currently performing and winning many awards at the Herefordshire Performing Arts Festival whilst our dancers once again excelled at the National Rock Challenge Dance Competition. I and so many others enjoyed the wonderful whole school production of The Wizard of Oz. The production captivated the audience from the very first scene and was hugely enjoyable. All the main actors performed flawlessly with panache, energy and enthusiasm. Every line was delivered with clarity and confidence. The cast were wonderful, creating a show that was visually spectacular with brilliant, acting, dancing and singing. The orchestra performed with great skill and professionalism. Accompanied by Mr Henderson, the school's ICT Manager, Ryan went to Boscombe Down, which is an MOD site run by QinetiQ, where he gave a presentation on his flight to a highly distinguished audience including Professor Chris Atkin, President of the RAS, and Donald Cameron MBE, founder of Cameron Balloons.

Mr Henderson commented: "The presentation was very well received and after lunch we were invited by Dr Sophie Robinson, the branch Chairwoman, to see the Meteorological Office Station where Ryan gained an invaluable insight into the work of a Meteorologist. We then visited the helicopter hanger where we sat in a Gazelle and looked at some of the other rotary wing aircraft of the Empire Test Pilots' School. All-in-all a fascinating and enjoyable day."

University Offers

We are delighted that John Masefield Sixth Form students are holding offers from some of the UK top universities. This year 38% of offers are from the highly competitive Russell Group universities and 12 offers are unconditional.

A summary of the courses applied for can be seen on the school website and highlights include offers for Medicine, Midwifery and Music (Oxford). The most popular courses this year were English Literature and Psychology.

We were very fortunate to be invited to take a group of ten of our Sixth Form language students together with ten of our talented Y10 linguists to a Language Day hosted at Hanley Castle High School. We joined 4 Worcestershire schools to take part in three 60 minute sessions, delivered by tutors from Oxford University. The sessions covered French and German literature at A level, translation skills and an introduction to Italian. Our students had the chance to experience an Oxford style tutorial and work with students from other schools on analysing and translating literary works, gaining an invaluable insight into the depth of study expected at university.

Y7 Boys County Indoor Athletics Champs, Y7 Girls Silver & Y8 **Girls Bronze**

Qualification took place at Whitecross School in January ahead of the school games finals. JMHS won the heats in Y7 Boys, Y7 Girls and Y8 Girls. At the school games, with a more challenging



format and fierce competition our students faced the notorious indoor athletics strength of Weobley as well as Whitecross and Bishops. Outstanding individual efforts and team performances in both track and field events left us in medal hopeful positions. The final scores were incredibly close, where the Y7 boys were crowned joint champions with Weobley, Y7 Girls placed silver and Y8 Girls won bronze. The Y7's have a second attempt during Y8 to grab boys and girls gold in 2018.

Regional Badminton Champions

After winning the county tournament, our KS3 Boys' badminton team travelled to Birmingham to represent Herefordshire in the Regional Badminton Finals. This is the third time the boys have made it to the regionals and they were determined and full of confidence to make it third time lucky. The matches consisted of two singles games and three doubles

games.
Chad Warren started the tournament on the front foot by comfortably winning his singles rubber. JJ Hobson and Max Williams stepped up to then win their doubles rubber followed by Sam Nicholls winning his singles game. The boys relaxed in the doubles eventually winning the match 4-1.

The team were able to win their second match 4-1 meaning they were through to the final. Nerves were building but the confidence hadn't dropped. Chad

Warren was tested but not enough to stop his momentum winning his match. The first doubles pairing of JJ and Max were beaten but not out. Sam faced a tough, strong opponent but was able to keep his nerve and play some excellent badminton. One more game to take the team through to the National finals. Up stepped Chad and Max and after some excellent doubles play, took the win and took the team to the next round.

The team has made JMHS sporting history to be the first ever team to make it to a National final. The boys are a credit to the school and we wish them all the best for the National Finals in May to be held in Milton Keynes.

Our Y7 students fought through arctic conditions at Whitecross School during their County Hockey Tournament. They faced 7 other schools from across the County and fought their way through the rounds, facing St Marys, Lucton, John Kyrle, Whitecross and Lady Hawkins to name a few. Our nemesis, Cathedral, beat us in a hard fought game, which was end to end and fantastic to watch. Overall we finished a very proud second place and wore our silver medals proudly home! The girls displayed grit and determination, even in horrendous conditions, never giving up. This experience has brought them closer as a team and increased their hunger for Hockey victory in Y8.
