Outstanding Achievement in Performance Tables

Students and staff are proud to be well above all other Herefordshire schools in the latest school performance tables for pupils aged 16-18.

For the 55 students who took A-Levels last year at JMHS Sixth Form, the Department for Education progress score was +0.42, well above all other schools in the county. This makes John Masefield the only school in Herefordshire to achieve a rating of 'well above average'.

The only school with more than 20 sixth formers in Worcestershire that achieved the same rating was Malvern College, with a progress score of +0.35, less than John Masefield.

Headteacher, Andy Evans is delighted that students at John Masefield Sixth Form are making better progress than students at many top public schools and grammar schools. He attributes this success to the combination of high-quality rigorous teaching, high expectations of staff of every student and the caring ethos of the school.

compared to a national average of just 12 per cent. Given that John Masefield Sixth Form is an all ability establishment that aims to nurture every student and has an extremely high completion rate, this represents an excellent achievement.

The current group of Y13 students are also excelling, with 95 per cent having received offers from their first-choice universities, including offers to study Mathematics at Cambridge; Wildlife and Ecology at Bristol; Aerospace Engineering at Manchester and Mechanical Engineering Nottingham. 



Due to Jamie Hiley's outstanding performance in the Senior Maths Challenge the UK Mathematics Trust selected him to take part in the British Maths Olympiad. This is a very prestigious competition which is designed to showcase mathematical understanding and skills beyond the A level curriculum. Jamie is one of only a handful of JMHS students (past and present) to have been asked to take part and he performed very well achieving an excellent score. Well done Jamie!

STRONG YOUNG MINDS

We are the Strong Young Minds Champions. We work to raise awareness and reduce the stigma around young people's mental health. During the Children's Mental Health awareness week in February, we promoted the '#beingourselves' campaign through a week of interactive house assemblies, a whole school survey and an information stand where we celebrated the '#meicanbe' campaign.

A third of the students in the school said as a result in the survey that they didn't feel students received adequate help at JMHS with regards to mental health problems. As a direct result of this we ran a workshop for teachers, where we found that none of them had ever had any specific mental health associated training, including members of the house office. The workshop covered topics such as; What is mental health? What conditions are young people experiencing? What they could do to have a healthy mental health themselves? What they could do? How and where students can get support?

All the 180 Strong Young Minds Champions, around Herefordshire were nominated in the Youth Champion category at the Hereford Community Champions Awards. Earlier this month, three of our members (Georgie Westaway, Zack Godfrey and Millie McCarthy) represented all the champions when they were invited to a meeting with all the other nominees at the Chairman of Herefordshire Council, Brian Wilcox's office at the Shire Hall. The Chairman discussed what the awards were about, and we had an interview with the Hereford times in which the nominations were later published.

On 16th March Georgie, Zack and Millie attended the award ceremony at the Town Hall in Hereford. Strong Young Minds were the winners of the Youth Champion category. We received a certificate, a trophy and £500 to use to invest back into the group to carry on the work we are doing as champions. It was a great night, we thoroughly enjoyed it and would like to thank the coordinators of Strong Young Minds and especially our coordinator Patricia Sarmiento for making this all possible.
