



Examination Board: WJEC (EDUCAS)

The first year of this course introduces students to the discipline of advanced Film Studies and develops knowledge about Hollywood, American film, Global film and documentary film-making; during the summer term, students produce their own short film or screenplay with an evaluation. The second year builds on this groundwork, considering British film since 1995 and significant Film movements – silent era and experimental.
