Points to note

Year 8 German Sequencing Rationale

Autumn: Most students start German with minimal prior knowledge. Pronunciation is taught first to build understanding and speaking confidence and to emphasise the strong link between sound and spelling. Students learn about language learning such as the role of cognates and genders and are introduced to the culture of the German speaking countries. They learn greetings, classroom language and how to give a range of personal details, mastering key vocabulary such numbers and colours. Students move onto the topic of school which introduces two essential language skills - how to express simple opinions and how to extend sentences with connectives, including verb scarers. The term ends with Christmas traditions in Germany. Spring: Students are familiar with German pronunciation and spelling. They can talk and write about themselves and school and learning has been in the present tense. The Spring term begins with new year's resolutions to introduce the future tense and the key principle of second verbs as infinitives. Students learn to describe family, revisiting ages and considering a range of vocabulary for appearance and character. They meet possessive adjectives and practise the essential verbs to have and to be. Looking at pets means revisiting negatives and the formation of plurals, as well as introducing ich möchte (I would like) as another high value future tense phrase with 2nd verb as an infinitive. The term ends with Easter traditions in Germany. Summer: This term aims to embed key vocab, as well as build upon the present and future tenses, using both to discuss free-time and home. Students begin with sport to practise opinions and they interview family about sport and report in writing. We focus on the essential leisure verbs, looking at present tense and retrieving ich möchte as a future tense. Students learn the key role of "gern/ nicht gern" to express opinions. We reuse time phrases and frequencies to add detail to leisure sentences and look at flipping. The final topic of home enables students to embed number formation with telephone numbers and describe where they live and would like to live. It introduces house and room vocabulary and the key phrase "es gibt" (there is/are). We also highlight the role of prepositions and the dative case, which is then practised in class with the game Cluedo. Culturally, students look at Sports Day in German schools.
