

GCSE Drama Assessment Overview

Component 1: Understanding drama

Knowledge and understanding of drama and theatre

Set text Study Things I know to be True by Andrew Bovell and Frantic Assembly.

Analysis and evaluation of the work of live theatre makers. The performance this year is to be confirmed.

Written exam: 1 hour and 45 minutes

Open book

80 marks 40% of GCSE

Questions

Section A: multiple choice (4 marks) – This question will feature roles in the performing arts industry. You must ensure that you know all of your technical vocabulary.

Section B: four questions on a given extract from the set play chosen (44 marks). When opening the exam paper, you must turn straight to the section on Things I Know to be True. There will be a short extract and then questions regarding production design (set, costume, lighting, sound and props) and acting (voice, gesture, facial expression, movement and relationships to other actors). You must ensure that you have a sound knowledge of the play and have already prepared your ideas for design and acting ideas through your learning and workshops on the play. You must be very aware of the context of the 1930s as this will be crucial in the development of your answer.

Section C: one question (from a choice) on the work of theatre makers in a single live theatre production (32 marks) is expected that in your answer you will be able to write a confident evaluation of using appropriate theatrical terminology. The usual format is that one question will focus on acting skills, and the other will concentrate on technical aspects of a production, but you should be prepared to answer on either of these elements. You will refer to Frankenstein by the National Theatre.

The top band mark scheme will always refer to clear descriptive detail and purposeful reference to the production.

Component 2: Devising drama (practical) Completed

Process of creating devised drama

Performance of devised drama (students may contribute as performer or designer)

Component 3: Texts in practice (practical) (Date to be confirmed during spring term)

The date for this exam is to be confirmed but will likely be in early March.

Performance of two extracts from one play (students may contribute as performer or designer)

Free choice of play but it must contrast with the set play chosen for Component 1. You will work with your teacher to choose the right play for your group.

Performance of Extract 1 (20 marks) and Extract 2 (20 marks)

40 marks in total
