If your child is finding it hard to complete homework at home, we do offer a Homework Club which runs from Monday to Thursday 3.30pm – 4.25pm.


- Access to a staff member, if they require help and support.

In addition, if your son or daughter has lost any items, please email your child's tutor, so they can alert staff.






Peripatetic Music Lessons –

Year 7 need to have a reading book in their bag at all times and they should read each day.


Students conduct a 200-word challenge write every fortnight to hone creative writing, editing and planning knowledge.

1. Mental Health

As a support the holistic development of all students. Part of this includes taking care of their mental health. With the reduction of the stigma surrounding mental health and more openness about the subject we are finding more students will talk when they are struggling. There has been a significant rise in students identifying with mental health concerns in the last four years from 1 in 9 in 2017 to 1 in 6 in the last NHS measure in 2022.

The CLD Trust supports schools and colleges with their whole school approach to improving and caring for students and staffs mental health and wellbeing, through the provision of training and access to therapy.

The CLD trust's counselling service is accredited with the British Association for Counselling and Psychotherapy, and they are also a member of NHS England's Improving Access to Psychological Therapies programme. The CLD Trust works with

Our friendly and professional team will listen to your worries, offer advice to support your needs.



What kind of things do parents/carers report to CEOP?

Things parents and carers have reported include:


- I am worried my child is being groomed online
- My child has shared a nude picture online and is now being threatened
- Someone is asking my child to communicate with them on a live-streaming platform
- My child is meeting up with someone they met online

- I've noticed changes in my child's behaviour which I think may be due to someone they met online
- My child has learning difficulties and I am worried about the people they are talking to online
- I am a foster carer/adoptive parent and I am worried that my child's abusive birth father/mother is trying to contact them online


MMGuardian is a parental control system consisting of a Parent App, installed on the parent's phone, which is used to manage and monitor the MMGuardian Parental Control app installed on a child's phone.

- When the child's device is an Android phone, you will receive alerts when text messages, certain social media chat messages or web searches are indicative of sexting, cyberbullying, suicidal thoughts and more.
- You will be able to monitor and block:
- SMS text messages
 - Web browsing activity
 - Application usage
 - To whom voice calls are made*



1. Allow students to have a sense of identity and purpose outside of the curriculum.


2. Break down barriers between age groups and push students out of their comfort zone to boost their confidence and self-esteem.
