The Careers Curriculum at JMHS

The careers curriculum at John Masefield High School runs through all 3 Key Stages and supports students to:

- Grow throughout life by learning and reflecting on themselves and their strengths.
- Manage career actively to make the most of opportunities and learn from setbacks.
- Create opportunities by being proactive and building positive relationships with others.
- Balance their life as a worker and/or entrepreneur with their wellbeing, other interests and your involvement with their family and community.
- Explore the possibilities open to them and learn about recruitment processes and the culture of different workplaces.
- See the big picture by paying attention to how the economy, politics and society connect with their own life and career.

Students work towards the following end points through the career's curriculum:

Key Stage 3 Year 7

Grow throughout life:

- record achievements (induction)
- be aware of heritage, identity and value

Manage career actively:

- be aware that career describes their journey through life, learning and work
- manage the transition into secondary school (induction)
- learn from setbacks and challenges

Create opportunities:

- develop friendships and relationships with others
- develop the ability to communicate their needs and wants
- be able to identify a role model and being aware of the value of leadership

Year 8

Grow throughout life:

- be aware of the sources of help and support available and responding positively to feedback
- be aware that learning, skills and qualifications are important for career being willing to challenge themselves and try new things

Explore the possibilities:

be aware of the range of possible jobs, sectors and organisations.

Create opportunities:

- be aware that it is important to take initiative in their learning and life
- be aware that building a career will require them to be imaginative and flexible
- be aware of the concept of entrepreneurialism and self-employment

Balance work and life:

- be aware of the concept of work-life balance
- be aware that physical and mental wellbeing are important
- be aware of money and that individuals and families have to actively manage their finances
- be aware of the ways that they can be involved in their family and community

Explore the possibilities:

- identify common sources of information about the labour market education system
- be aware of the main learning pathways (e.g. university, college and apprenticeships)
- be aware that many jobs require learning, skills and minimum qualifications
- be aware of the range of ways that organisations undertake recruitment and selection

Manage career actively:

- look forward to the future imagining a range of possibilities for themselves in their career
- be aware that different jobs and careers bring different challenges and rewards
- prepare for choosing their GCSEs

Balance work and life:

- be aware of rights and responsibilities in the workplace and in society
- recognise the injustices caused by prejudice, stereotypes and discrimination in learning and workplaces

- be aware of a range of different media, information sources and viewpoints
- be aware that there are trends in local and national labour markets
- be aware that trends in technology and science have implications for career
- be aware of the relationship between career, community, politics and the economy

Key Stage 4 Year 10
