- Poundbury

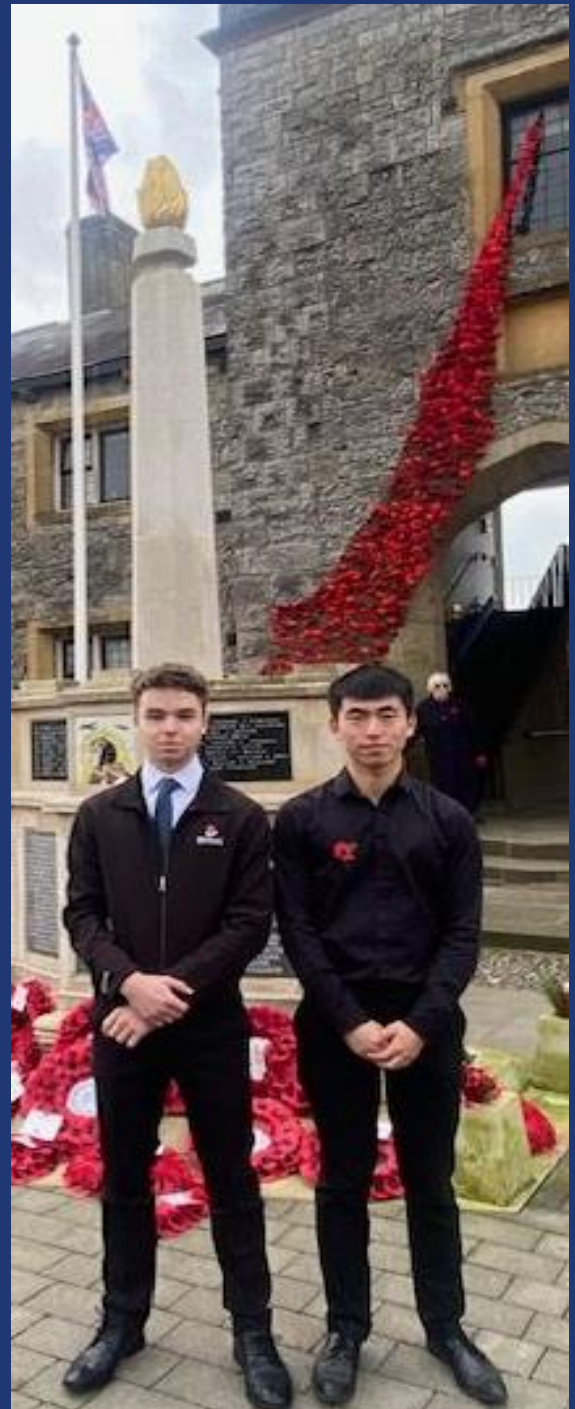




November

CERN

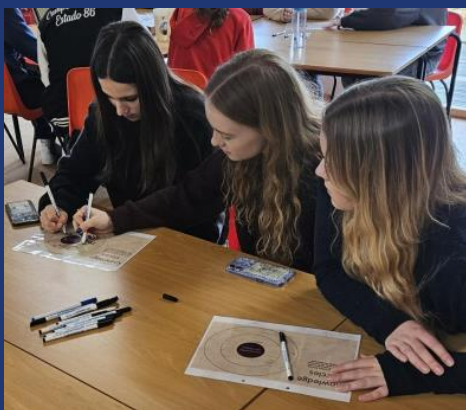
A group of Year 12 and 13 Physics students went to CERN. The European Organization for Nuclear Research, known as CERN, is an intergovernmental organization that operates the largest particle physics laboratory in the world. Established in 1954, it is based in Meyrin, a western suburb of Geneva, on the France – Switzerland border. The students also had the opportunity to visit an observatory, the History of Science museum, the United Nations building and saw the Alice experiment at CERN. They explored Belair where they were able to sample the local cuisine and speak some of the native language, French.





Psychology trip

Psychology students visited West Midlands Safari Park to conduct an observation on meerkats, investigating which group behaviours were the most common in prey species in captivity. They also put their knowledge into practice, designing a systematic desensitisation session to treat common phobias, including arachnophobia and murophobia - a fear of rats!



Christmas activities

At the beginning of December the Sixth Form was transformed into a Christmas wonderland with trees, baubles and tinsel, to get everyone into the Christmas spirit.
